



Dear Friends,

I write this before the last Sunday of August. As we enter September, we'll begin reading the Epistle of James as one of our readings in worship.

This letter was written by the brother of Jesus probably around the mid-40s A.D., so shortly after Jesus' crucifixion, rising, and ascension. James is unlike many books of the New Testament in that it contains a fair amount of proverbs as its literary genre. It challenges us to live according to God's intentions.

With reformers such as Martin Luther, it has a challenging place. Luther wrote, "St. James' epistle is really an epistle of straw, compared to these others, for it has nothing of the nature of the Gospel about it." He wrote elsewhere that this letter offers much trouble as the Roman Catholics embraced it as a primarily authority and ignore many other parts of the New Testament.

This was written in a time when reformers accused the Roman Catholic Church of expressing a works-based Gospel — that it is our works that earn our place in heaven. The reformers generally found more theological meat in Paul's letters and tended to emphasize passages such as Ephesians 2:8-9 (*NRSV*): "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God — not the result of works, so that no one may boast." Here Paul establishes with little question that it is God's grace and free gift of faith that enable us for salvation — not what we do of our own will.


So how do we reconcile these perspectives for James states "What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? **Can faith save you?** If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill,' and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead (James 2:14-17, *NRSV*)."

Paul does in his letters discuss works that should be exhibited by a Christian. In the Reformed Faith, we accept both perspectives. We are most surely saved by grace through faith and NOT by works. Experiencing this grace and having this faith and trust in God leads us to perform good works in thankfulness to God. Works are a response to God's grace and free gift of faith. As we learn of God's incredible gift to each of us, the work of Jesus on the cross, and God's plan to re-new this world into a perfect world, we join God in his work. We love God and neighbor, we share God's good news with people throughout the world, we gather together as a fellowship in this work and to worship God regularly. If we don't see these and other qualities as identified in scripture, we are left wondering whether we are really saved at all. We find a faith that is dead, unproductive, essentially non-existent. This is particularly obvious when we consider that faith is not only intellectual acceptance but, also, trust — trust that God's ways and expectations are right and just — even when they conflict with our desires and conclusions.

You'll find other mentions of our Wednesday evening program this fall beginning at 6pm with a meal, with worship, and with our discipleship program. I invite our adults to join us, which is different from previous years. We're adding an adult discipleship program so that members and friends of all ages can grow in Christ and be transformed for this is God's call to even one of us. For some of our youth and for our adults, we'll be using the Alpha Course, which has been offered across the world and in many denominations to teach the basics of the Christian faith. My hope is that it will fill in gaps in your own understanding and encourage your faith significantly as it did for me several years ago as I was invited to help lead it in a Roman Catholic student center.

Please come, enjoy a meal and fellowship, worship God, and learn about becoming modern disciples of Jesus Christ.

On June 16th, we held a Summer Round-up at the park in Conrad. Hamburgers and hotdogs were served, along with some delicious contributions from those who attended. There were approximately 40 people in attendance. The weather was pretty near perfect (except for some wind) and it turned

out to be a perfect opportunity for members to reconnect, and the evening was spent in fellowship and making up for time lost during the pandemic.



The week of June 21st – 25th, Presbyterian Church and Pondera Valley Lutheran Church cosponsored Vacation Bible School at the Presbyterian Church. The day camp was staffed by counselors from Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp and ran from 9:00 AM to 1:30 PM. Due to restrictions from FLBC, we were only allowed to have 30 participants; we had 15 young people at the Presbyterian Church. Our preschool class was held at Pondera Valley Lutheran Church. It went from Tuesday through Thursday from 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM and also had about 15 participants. On Friday, the children presented a short program, and we concluded the week with a picnic on the lawn.

Six of our youth signed up to attend Glacier Camp this past summer. Three of the young people were able to attend the camps that they had signed up for. Unfortunately, there was an incident with a Covid-19 exposure. This incident made it necessary for camp leadership to make the painful decision to cancel the last two weeks of camp; much to everyone's disappointment this meant that the other three campers would not be able to attend the camps they had signed up for.

In between sessions, there was plenty of time to renew old acquaintances and make new ones. Friday evening a book study on the book "Lessons Learned From a Sheepdog" was presented. On Saturday, there was the business meeting and a session of "Chair Yoga." 

Session Highlights - August 2021



- 1. The Wednesday Evening Prayer group completed the book *Kneeling with Giants* and concluded the program with a discussion with the author Gary Hansen via Zoom.
- 2. Everyone has enjoyed spending time together at Coffee Hour following worship now that it's being held in the Fellowship Hall.
- 3. Pastor Smothers has moved into the Tonra Apartments after his rental was sold.
- 4. Pastor Smothers' will take study leave October 11th thru 24th.
- 5. Besides the glass in the door on the west side of the church being broke, there have been a couple other acts of mischief reported. The Conrad Police Dept has been by to visit about these incidents and other reports of vandalism in the community. After hearing these reports, the Session requested the Technology and Property Committee to investigate the cost of installing security cameras on the church building.

The Finance Committee reports:

- 1. The Committee reported that more donations have been received to cover the cost of the new carpet in the hallway of the education building.
- 2. The Session named Greg Kellogg and Patricia Keil authorized traders for the church's funds held in the Presbyterian Foundation New Covenant Funds.
- 3. The Session made a recommendation to the Pastor Nominating Committee setting a minimum and maximum effective salary for a new called pastor.

The Worship Committee reports:

- 1. Communion will be served Sunday, September 5th & 19th and October 3rd.
- 2. The Session suggested that due to the rise in COVID cases in Pondera County the choir not start practicing and singing during worship during the month of September.
- 3. September 5th Worship begins at 11:00 AM.

The Christian Education Committee reports:

1. It was the consensus of the Session to dissolve the Christian Education Committee. Carol DayRider was named Superintendent of the Wednesday Church School and Marla Bruner the Director of the Wednesday Youth and Adult Education program. They gave these two individuals the authority to select teachers, curriculum and set schedules.

The Membership Committee reports:

1. Signing up to serve Coffee Hour seems to be working quite well so the Committee will continue with that format through the rest of the year.

The Pastor Nominating Committee reports:

1. They have been setting up Zoom meetings with candidates.
